POHEWA - *To create, to imagine (verb) Food basket (noun)*

Cakes, Culture, Critters and Creatures of Aotearoa!

Akongā will develop observational drawing skills and apply these to a series of works in a range of disciplines based on their individual stylistic strengths. They will be asked philosophical questions and will be dealing with social and political issues. Art making will be viewed in a wider context and will consider conceptual ideas. Students will learn to discuss their work and that of others through critiques in a collaborative environment where they learn from each other and from established artists. Throughout the course they will work individually and collaboratively to achieve their

outcomes. The purpose is for akonga to develop skills in a range of media and to become independent thinkers, confident in their own decision making.

Nau te rourou, naku te rourou, ka ora te manuhiri

This whakatauki is about the opportunity to come together, share ideas and form meaningful relationships with others to enable all to flourish. It acknowledges that thinking is not a solo act and speaks of manaakitanga - generosity of spirit and collaboration.

Seek the treasure you value most dearly: if you bow your head, let it be to a lofty mountain

This whakatauki is about aiming high or for what is truly valuable, and about being persistent and not allowing obstacles stop you from reaching your goals. As a faculty we have high expectations and will encourage you to stand up for your values and to have belief in your own ability.

BELONG - Our Art Department Whānau and Culture

The Visual Art Faculty support you to be yourself, to follow your own interests and to develop your thinking and questioning skills alongside practical skills in art making. Our goal is for you to become a well-rounded, reflective, independent learner, confident in your own decision making and with a strong sense of self-belief. In this course we help you develop your own individual strengths by establishing habits where you regularly reflect on your learning, plan your next steps, and develop goals. We create an environment where you learn from others through discussion, class critiques, peer feedback and working collaboratively. Staff will facilitate your learning through in-depth questioning to support you to reach your full potential. We focus on challenging and extending your cognitive skills and technical ability. You will be encouraged to take risks in your artmaking, to embrace failures and see them as opportunities to problem solve. You will develop strong selfmanagement skills. In the Visual Art Faculty, we provide learning opportunities based on your ideas and stylistic interests. You will be inspired, challenged, and empowered! As kiako, we mentor

collaborative learning behaviours and create a strong sense of belonging. The Art Department is a hive of activity. It is a fun and friendly place with high expectations where students are encouraged to maximise every moment in class. We establish a sense of whānau, with a culture where students support each other to deepen understanding as a community of learners. It is important to Visual Arts staff, that your strengths and challenges are known and that successes are celebrated. If you have a particular area of expertise, we encourage you to show leadership and pass on your knowledge to others. In the Art rooms you will feel a strong sense of whakaute – respect, aroha, ngaana - enthusiasm and care towards each other.

Staff

Our Visual Art faculty are a passionate and positive team who work collaboratively to support you. We are committed to continuous improvement and regularly seek feedback from ākonga. We establish an environment of listening, voicing, and respecting each other’s opinions based on respect, aroha and care. The Visual Art Department operates in a learning environment that is open, therefore you may have input from anyone of the other Visual Art teachers and you will learn alongside, and from, ākonga in different year levels. We foster collaboration between areas and believe in life-long learning. All Visual Art staff are working on their own inquiry-based learning/artmaking. Staff mentor sustainable practices, for wellbeing and the environment.

Health and Safety

You are required to read and sign our Health and Safety document, and watch demonstrations, to ensure you are familiar with, and agree to, our systems and policies in Visual Arts. As the rooms are workshop studios, earphones are not permitted.

Materials and Charges

A kit of art materials required for the year is ordered for you and charged to your account. By ordering in bulk, we obtain a reduced price, less packaging, and no courier fees. Having all goods delivered directly to the Art Department also helps keep down our Rangī carbon footprint. We encourage you to reuse gear from previous years.

Completing mahi outside of class

You are welcome to work in the rooms during the lunch hour providing you tidy up after yourself! Make sure you do not work alone and inform whānau if you are staying at school for Art Club on Thursdays. Year 13 tutors can help teach any missed learning due to absences.

Device Use

You are not permitted to use your phone or headphones during class. This has been put in place to help focus on output in this subject. If you need to use the camera on your phone, please seek permission from your teacher.

Critiques

These are crucial to learning in this subject. Discussing your learning and that of others, communicating clearly, being kind, open-minded and resilient and, sharing ideas is an integral component of learning in Visual Arts. Rikarika – endeavour helps in being reflective and understanding your strengths and areas for growth.

Trips

Learning opportunities outside of the classroom may include a trip to the Te Puna o Waiwhetu - Christchurch Art Gallery. Viewing exhibitions helps you become inquisitive and develop curiosity.
